he Felician College campus was busy this summer, welcoming students from around the world who traveled to study English and experience the United States first-hand. High school students attended our inaugural ESL Summer Camp, which offered students aged 15 to 17 the opportunity to live on a college campus, study English in the morning, and participate in sight-seeing and American culture activities in the afternoon and on the weekends.

The combined 39 participants in our 2010 ESL Summer Camp came to us from St. Peter's School in Portugal, and Midorigaoka High School in Japan. The students had the opportunity of a lifetime to practice English in the classroom and with their new friends – learning not only a second language, but about each other's cultures as well.

For college-age students, the Office of International Programs offered a special Summer Study Abroad program, giving students four weeks of intensive English classes, on- and off-campus activities, and many opportunities to go sight-seeing in New York City. We were delighted to welcome a group of students from Providence University of Taichung, Taiwan, for this program in July. Students lived in our dormitories, took classes with students from more than 10 different countries, and in the evenings and on weekends, visited New York City and Philadelphia, attended a Broadway show, spent the day in an amusement park and much more.

Summer at Felician College is not just for groups, though. We were pleased to welcome students from around the world to our year-round ESL program, offering the same on- and off-campus activities, quality personalized English language courses, and opportunities to visit New York City and other parts of the U.S.

Some students participated in the summer program to improve their English, allowing them to begin their full-time academic degree studies at Felician in the fall. Others came to improve their English before returning home for school and work. It was an experience they will never forget!

IMMIGRATION REMINDERS!

Before You Enter the U.S.

- As soon as you receive your I-20, go online to https://www.fmjfee.com/i901fee/ to pay your SEVIS fee of \$200. Select "Proceed to I-901 Form and Payment," and click the bubble for "I-20" and then "OK." Follow the steps to pay the fee, and when you are finished, print out the receipt from the Web site. You will receive an official receipt in the mail in a few weeks, but you must take the receipt you print to the consul when you have your visa interview. As soon as you have paid your SEVIS fee, you can schedule your visa interview with the consulate.
- ➤ Before your visa interview, carefully read the document entitled "Important Visa and Travel Information," and make sure that you have gathered all of the necessary documents to satisfy the consular officer. Remember, you must show convincing ties to your home country, or you are likely to be denied a visa!
- At your visa interview, remember the seven "Strategies for the Visa Appointment." It is your job to convince the consular officer that you should receive a student visa; be prepared to answer the consular's questions respectfully, concisely, and in English.

For Students in the U.S.

- ➢ If you just arrived at Felician College for the first time or after your summer break, you must stop by our offices to fill out a "Certification of Arrival, Request for Registration" form. If you do not fill out this form and have it signed by your advisor/ESL coordinator, your I-20 will be terminated, since we will not be able to certify that you have arrived in the U.S. to begin/continue your studies.
- If you would like to leave the U.S. before the "program end date" on your I-20, you must come to our offices to fill out an "Authorized Early Withdrawal Request." If you do not ask for permission to withdraw early, your I-20 will be terminated for unauthorized early withdrawal, and you will be required to leave the U.S. immediately.
- If you are about to travel outside the U.S. or close to the U.S. border with Canada or Mexico, please bring your I-20 to our offices for endorsement. You must have your I-20 signed before leaving the United States, or you might not be allowed to reenter the country when you return.
